### Outpatient Behavioral Health

(ages 3 and up)

- Served 756 clients
- Financial distribution 80% Medicaid 15% Commercial 5% Self-pay
- Primary diagnosis:
  34% Neurodevelopment Disorder
  (ADHD, ADD, etc.)
  27% Depressive Disorders

18% Trauma- and Stressor-related Disorders

10% Anxiety Disorders

7% Disruptive, Impulsive, Control, and Conduct Disorders 4% Others



#### Family Link

## (Community-based Program, ages 6-17)

- Served 754 youth
- 97% of youth served were still living with their parent/guardian six months after exiting the program
- 99% of youth completed counseling services
- 84% of youth attended school regularly at the completion of services
- 99% of youth were not arrested while receiving services





#### **SNAP**

### (Stop Now and Plan clinical, ages 6-11)

- Served 33 children, 37 parents and 24 siblings
- Provided a total of 532 groups group topics included anger management, understanding blame, anti-bullying behaviors, understanding feelings, and problem-solving skills
- 70% of participants completed the program
- 100% of youth attended school regularly 30 days after completing the program
- 100% of children remained with their parents
  60 days after completing the program



# SNAP In Schools (ages 6-11)

- 176 children served
- Operated in 12 schools throughout Duval County
- Conducted 119 sessions in elementary school classrooms
- Over 90% of participants completed the program
- 100% of youth attended school regularly 30 days after completing the program



### **Touchstone Village**

### (ages 18-21)

- 36 young adults served
- Of the 36 residents, 22 entered the program with a high school diploma, 5 graduated high school with their diploma while in the program, and 17 were enrolled in higher education (i.e., college, technical school or certification)
- 100% of residents successfully mastered life skills
- 100% of residents who resided in the program for at least nine months were steadily employed
- 100% of residents received employment skills training during the first three months in the program

## Residential Crisis Care Facility (ages 10-17)

- 540 youth were served
  248 females and 292 males
- Of the 540 youth, 73 were admitted under the domestic violence respite program (39 females and 34 males) and 18 were admitted under civil citation program
- 97% of youth were reunited with their family at completion of services
- 96% of youth successfully completed services
- 100% of youth were screened by YCC nursing staff within 24 hours of intake

Revenues
